

As the anticipation of spring songbird migration builds with the northbound movement of waterfowl, late winter is a great time to begin listening and learning bird songs. "Kittatinny Songsters" highlights birds of the Kittatinny Ridge by sharing methods of vocal identification using amplified songs and photos. Enjoy the splashing colors of neo-tropical migrant warblers, and review our year-round resident birds.

The Kittatinny Ridge is the largest contiguous forest in southeastern Pennsylvania, providing important songbird migration and nesting habitat. Many parts of the Ridge, however, are threatened, especially the "Susquehanna Water Gap," where the Ridge and River intersect. All are welcome to this multi-media program about the birds we love and efforts to protect their habitat in central Pennsylvania.

Chris Rebert is a naturalist at Wildwood Lake Sanctuary in Harrisburg. He enjoys sharing his enthusiasm for the outdoor world through teaching and learning natural history. In the past, Chris has worked as a naturalist for Audubon Pennsylvania and Lancaster County Parks. He had the opportunity to co-author the Susquehanna River Birding and Wildlife Trail guide while working for Audubon. During his studies at Penn State, a professor lit the fire for Chris and he has been hooked on birds ever since.

As DEP's Highlands Action Program Coordinator for Pennsylvania, Paul Zeph is working to protect and restore important areas of the Appalachian Forest ecosystem, with the Kittatinny Ridge being an important part of this program. He was previously the coordinator of the Kittatinny Conservation Project for Audubon Pa., and Executive Director of Audubon Iowa.

Success for Operation Migration

Operation Migration, a program that Appalachian Audubon Society has been supporting for most of its life, successfully concluded their 2007 trip from Necedah Wildlife Refuge in Wisconsin to Chassahowitzka National Wildlife

Refuge, Florida, with 16 new Whooping Cranes. This was a 97-day trip of 1262 miles. Past trips have taken from 56 to 71 days. Bad weather was the culprit that caused this trip to take so long. Of course all the extra days cost extra money; all the more reason that Operation Migration needs our help! The good news is that there will be 16 new Whoopers added to the growing new flock that will migrate from Wisconsin to Florida, thus hopefully insuring the continuation of wild Whooping Cranes in America.

We had a full house for Dauphin County Wildlife Rescue's rescheduled AAS program in late January. Beth and John Carricato brought along Lester, the Great Horned owl; a Screech owl; Spike, the Red-tailed hawk; a kestrel; and a Black Rat snake. Children young and old enjoyed observing and learning about these creatures that we rarely get to see up close.

It was mating season for Great Horned owls, and Lester was in the mood for love. As soon as AAS president, Lorrie Preston, started making announcements, Lester began vocalizing from inside his cage. His calls came intermittently at first, but as the announcements continued, he became more insistent and repetitive. John Carricato announced that he had never, EVER heard Lester be so vocal, and suggested that Lester was attracted to Lorrie's voice and was sending out his mating call, which got quite a chuckle from the audience.

Our chapter has been collecting *Coins for Conservation* at our monthly meetings to feed and support the varied wildlife in the care of Dauphin County Wildlife Rescue. We were very pleased to be able to present a check for \$95 to the Carricatos, from members' pocket change and donations collected since September. Another \$64.15 was collected that evening. The AAS Board of Directors is pleased to announce an exciting new direction for the Grace Randolph Scholarship funds that we began awarding in 2002. We have been unable to award this \$500 scholarship for the past 3 years, due to lack of applicants. In order to pass on Grace's passion for birds and nature on an annual basis, we will now award five separate \$100 Grace Randolph Scholarships to attendees of the local Wildwood Nature Day Camps, which take place each summer at the Olewine Nature Center and Wildwood Lake.

The scholarship recipients will be students with financial need, who would not otherwise be able to attend the summer camps. It is our desire to bring hope, curiosity, and inspiration to children of the inner city, who do not often get a chance to explore the world of nature.

Grace was a nature day camp leader for inner-city children near Washington D.C. in years past, and Wildwood Lake was one of her favorite birding spots, so we feel this is a very appropriate change. Grace's grown children have also given their enthusiastic approval to this new direction.

The camps are hosted by Dauphin County Parks and Recreation and we thank them for working with us to provide this opportunity to local students. Invitation for WWII Veterans: Nation's First "Honor Bus" Program

Students, teachers and staff from the Mechanicsburg Middle School (MMS) have made arrangements to take local World War II veterans by bus on a free day trip to Washington, D.C., to visit their memorial and tour the city. The MMS group is partnering with the Ohio-based "Honor Flights Network" (www.honorflights.org) to create the nation's first "Honor Bus" program, with the generous support of local sponsors.
