

November 20 Program - Birds and Wildlife of New Hampshire



Many people never think to go to New Hampshire for birdwatching, but the secret is out - New Hampshire is a birders' paradise! Long-time AAS member Terry Neumeyer taught birding at Lake Winnipesaukee for Elderhostel for nine years, and tells us that Lake "Winnie," the largest lake in NH, is a bird magnet drawing over 100 species of birds in the spring and fall. Highlights include the

Bicknell's Thrush, Boreal Chickadee, and Spruce Grouse. Warblers abound in the nearby forests and streams. Loon lovers will want to learn about their three different calls. During this program we will also explore the White Mountains including Mt. Washington, the "Olde Man on The Mountain", the Flume, and the Silver Cascades. Join us as Terry guides us on a photographic tour of this surprising birding mecca.

And as always, meetings begin at 7:00 p.m. with refreshments and social time followed by announcements, with the program starting at 7:30 p.m.

Project FeederWatch Benefits Birds and People

More than 100 studies have shown that getting closer to nature reduces stress and promotes a feeling of well-being in children and adults. So, filling feeders and counting the birds that visit may be just what the doctor ordered! For more than 20 years, that's what participants in the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's Project FeederWatch have been doing--benefitting themselves and the birds.

The 2008-09 season of **Project FeederWatch gets underway November 8** and runs through April 3. Participants count the numbers and kinds of birds at their feeders each week and send the information to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Scientists learn something new from the data each year, whether it's about the movements of common backyard birds or unusual sightings of rarely-seen species.



Project FeederWatch welcomes participants of all ages and skill levels, from scout troops and retirees to classrooms and nature center visitors. In return for the \$15 fee (\$12 for Lab members) participants receive the *FeederWatcher's Handbook*, an identification poster of the most common feeder birds in their area, a calendar, complete instructions, and the FeederWatch annual report, *Winter Bird Highlights*.


Giant and Weis Gift Cards for Groceries, Gasoline, or Gift Giving
