A Fledge Watch Scrap Book

In the middle of the 20th Century, Peregrine Falcons suffered a sharp decline due to the widespread use of DDT and similar chemicals. Rachel Carson brought the plight of the peregrines to light with eloquence and courage that inspired action and saved the birds. It is fitting that Harrisburg's peregrines nest on the building that bears her name.

Sue Hannon, a member of Appalachian Audubon's Board, has been a volunteer with Harrisburg's Peregrine Falcon Fledge Watch for the past ten years. In monitoring the activities of the young birds preparing for their first flight, she has witnessed some special moments with these voungsters that include dramatic rescues. fledging triumphs, and heart-breaking tragedies—all part of the lives of Harrisburg's beloved Peregrine Falcons.

At the April program meeting, Sue will recount some of her experiences as part of the Fledge Watch team and share photos of these charismatic birds, on the ledge and in the air, as they claim

their heritage of flight. Sue will also have news of Harrisburg offspring successfully nesting as adults in their own territories and an update on the status of this year's chicks.

2016 Appeal Designees

Red Creek Wildlife Center is a non-profit that is licensed to rehabilitate injured birds, mammals, amphibians, and reptiles. Located in Schuylkill County, Red Creek is the closest rehab to the AAS area that accepts a wide variety of species. This is where the Harrisburg Peregrine fledglings are taken if they require any care or monitoring. These valuable services, offered at no charge to the public, are supported by donations. Red Creek also provides training in the art of rehabilitation and presents educational programs about wildlife using animals that can't be released.

A 30-acre parcel at the headwaters of **LeTort Spring** Run in Carlisle is set to be protected by the Central PA Conservancy with financial support from Trout Unlimited and other sporting and conservation organizations. The acquisition will protect the headwaters of LeTort Spring Run and its wetland, meadow, and upland buffer. This renowned fly-fishing stream provides prime habitat for wild brown trout, while the surrounding land supports terrestrial insects that feed birds.

With the help of conservation-minded organizations like AAS and individuals like you, valuable land can be protected from development and injured wildlife will receive urgently needed care. Please consider joining other AAS members in support of protecting the headwaters of LeTorte Spring Run and assisting Red Creek Wildlife Rehab.

UPDATE: Summer Teen Camp, Goddard Leadership Legacy Institute (GLLI)

Last fall at our September program meeting we enjoyed hearing about teen experiences with the GLLI camp. Applications are now open for this summer's camps. The GLLI is coordinated by the Central Pennsylvania Conservancy (CPC) in cooperation with its lead partner, Pine Grove Furnace State Park. They are joined this year by the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. The GLLI camp is designed for ages 13–15 and will be held July 12–July 17. This year the camp will run three days in Pennsylvania, based at the Ironmaster's Mansion in Pine Grove Furnace State Park in Gardners, PA, and two days at the LEEDcertified Phillip Merrill Environmental Center in Annapolis, MD, and will include experiences on a workboat on the Chesapeake Bay. Explore conservation leadership, environmental and government issues, marine biology, water quality and ecosystems, field studies, land use, agriculture, and forestry, while also exploring our state parks and the Chesapeake Bay. Rain and Ring-necks: The AAS March Field Trip Report

After two years of having our annual Middle Creek field trip "iced out," we finally managed to sneak one in. Our leader, Pete Fox, met us at Lower Dauphin High School on March 13th, and seven hardy birders headed to Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area on a rainy pilgrimage to see Snow Geese, Tundra Swans, and hopefully, Short-eared Owls. Upon arrival, we were greeted by a welcome committee of Ring-necked Ducks, Black Ducks, American Coots, and a lone Horned Grebe. After a brief rest stop at the Visitors Center, we began the driving tour route, where we were greeted this time by a Ringnecked Pheasant. Our plan was to scan the fields at Stop #3, where Short-eared Owls had been reported during the past few days. Our thinking was that these diurnal owls might be active on a low light, rainy mid-afternoon. Instead we were fortunate to see our first of the year (FOY) Eastern Meadowlark, thanks to Dominic Mirarchi's keen spotting skills. The group later heard two more of these cheery birds. Although we spotted no owls or harriers, we watched as several flocks of Snow Geese and Tundra Swans flew overhead, a spectacle in itself. A final loop around the lake yielded a single Common Merganser drake among the Canada Geese and several more songbirds. The last find of the day was when Peggy Price spotted a Great Blue Heron rookery back in the trees off the main road, while we searched for the owls in the fields. We were quite surprised to see that at least eight of the Great Blue Heron nests were already occupied. Although the numbers of Snow Geese and Tundra Swans were waning and we didn't see owls, we enjoyed a rainy afternoon with several FOY birds and the hope of things to come soon. Thank you Pete!
